




The Henry Box School GCSE History Revision Resources

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Next you will find details of both videos and podcasts you could use to help you revise. Whilst these resources are great they must be used in combination with written revision too not instead of. We would suggest that you make notes as you listen and use a 'listen, pause, write and then check'.

Remember revision in history should be used to help you get an idea of the narrative of events but you will need to remember specific dates, names, places and statistics.

<p>Video clips: These clips are all concise, giving you a useful summary of each event. They include some relevant images but these can be distracting so you may find it easier to listen to them rather than watch them.</p>	<p>Bitesize history videos: The Bitesize revision site has three sections for you to use. Firstly a 'revise' section to read, a 'video' section to watch and finally a 'test' section to complete.</p>
